Christ Church Cathedral was important to him and he remembered the Cathedral in his will: he provided an unrestricted bequest of \$200,000 and a bequest of \$100,000 for the continued outreach work of Church Street Eats. He had been a dedicated volunteer for Church Street Eats. Our deepest sympathy to his brother, Walter Cox, of Tulsa. George will be sorely missed.

Welcome to the Rev. Canon Timothy Hodapp

The Rev. Canon Timothy Hodapp has been named a Priest Associate at the Cathedral. He serves the Diocese of Connecticut as the Canon for Mission Leadership. Formerly a resident of Minnesota, he is also a former Roman Catholic priest. After taking a leave from active ministry, he launched a career as writer and communications strategist, founding and serving as principal of Hodapp Communications. A few years after joining the Episcopal Church, he investigated the possibility of becoming an Episcopal priest. Following graduate studies in Episcopal polity, history, governance and missiology, he was received as a priest in 2009. He was later called to serve as Canon Missioner for Mission in Minnesota. In Connecticut, his primary responsibility is to work with parishes in time of transition to help bring about missional transformation.

Statement from the Bishops on the Supreme Court Decisions on DOMA and the Voting Rights Act of 1965

On June 27, Bishops Douglas, Curry and Ahrens of the Diocese of Connecticut issued the following statement:

We give thanks for the recognition of state and federal law enacted by the Supreme Court's decision to strike down provisions of the Defense of Marriage Act. In Connecticut that means that all married couples will have the same status before the law. This is a move forward for equal justice for all and the civil rights of gay and lesbian people. We give thanks for the marriages of our gay and lesbian brothers and sisters, and the voice of the General Convention offering rites of blessing for their love.

At the same time, we grieve the decision of the Supreme Court regarding Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 and will continue to strive for all citizens to have just access to the full right to vote and to be equitably represented in state and federal legislatures.

We commit ourselves to God's reconciling love and the ministry of listening to and caring for all God's children as we work for justice and peace.
